Near here is the only church in town to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The (13) Church is next to Coe-Brown Academy.
Now, let's head to the Narrows. Before Northwood was incorporated on February 6, 1773, John Batchelder of Hampton and Moses Godfrey, began clearing land in East Northwood. They established a settlement in 1763 when the area was still part of Nottingham. Solomon and John Bickford proceeded to the area that is now known at the Narrows to establish another settlement. In November of 1765 Samuel Johnson arrived and spent his first night sleeping between two rocks, covering himself with boughs to stay warm. Find these boulders. Please note: There is no parking at this site that is not on private property. You can park at the Community Center and walk to it from there or view a photo of this plaque found on page 8 in History and Remembrances of The Northwood Meadows State Park by M. Edward Burtt - Call number R 974.2 BUR. This is in the Chesley Memorial Library. What is the second number (not date) that appears after Samuel Johnson's name in the inscription? (14)
Most of Northwood did not have rural delivery of mail until the winter of 1965 when a central Post Office was built where the police station is now located. Previously each family went to a Post Office in their section of town (usually located in stores) to receive their mail. This worked well. One could do shopping, pick up mail and see and talk with neighbors. From 1960 to 1965 after the last store in this area of town was closed, the Post Office was moved to a little building beside a brook. This building is currently being preserved by the Northwood Historical Society. Today you can stop and rest on a (20) outside of this building.
Another historic marker, which is in western Northwood, commemorates a highway. It was the first toll (15) in New Hampshire.
While we are at this side of town, let's swing by the only museum in Northwood. It is the James A. Bryant Memorial Library building and current home of the
Public Library system. Before that time the books had been kept in private homes, some in each section of town. The collection was moved into the recently constructed library in 1940, built

making his living as a freighter of shoe parts and finished shoes. Now, let's travel to the eastern side of Northwood. This is the oldest church in Northwood, dating back to July 7, 1779 when a group met in the home of one of the first settlers, Moses Godfrey. About 1878 a clock was installed in the steeple, making this the only church in Northwood that has a clock in its steeple. What is the name of this church? This next building is the only one in Northwood to be named to the New Hampshire State Register of Historic Places, which occurred in 2019. It opened in October 1954 and the collection from the Bryant Library was moved here. It is the (17). The next several clues can be found here in the reference section including the clue above concerning Samuel Johnson. Life in earlier days on _____ (18), the highest point in town, is described as reminiscences of her childhood by Ruth Montgomery (19) in her book The Chanticleer Weathervane. The paragraph beginning at the bottom of page 161 describes a (21) that was later used as a doll house. In early times shoes were made for each individual customer in the home of a shoemaker. By 1850, Northwood was a prosperous shoe making town, at least 18 homes in the Center alone worked on shoes. In 1866, the first large shoe factory was built in East Northwood near where the Irving gas station is now located. The last factory, which closed in 1929, was built in 1899 and was located in the area of the current TD Bank. Shortly before 1880 J.R. Towle built a small shoe factory in the area opposite the Narrows Fire Station. When the business prospered, a larger factory was built in 1887. However, it was destroyed by fire in 1895. Home shoe shops which remained open during the time of the big factories continued to do piecework for more than a decade into the beginning of the 20th century. The founding fathers of Northwood realized the importance of education and at the first town meeting, on March 23, 1773, seven pounds and four shillings was raised for the support of schools, which were located in five sections of the town. At one time there were nine school districts in Northwood so no child had to walk more than a mile to school. Most contained only one room, while a few others needed two rooms due to the number of students in that school district. A history of these schools can be found in the booklet _____ (22)? Hint: It has a bright cover. Idle gossip is nothing new. Back in 1979 it was rumored that the current _____ (23) was going to be a storage area for the nuclear fuel from Seabrook. Another was that an oil refinery would come here or that it would become the site for 400 homes. This is all described on page 52 of the book referenced above by M. Edward Burtt, who was the owner of the property. Many other interesting and little known facts of this

property's history are contained in this writing.
